
Is it expensive to join a yacht club?



A map of NZ is superimposed to show the latitudes involved. Left to right are the last 90 days from mid-May to mid-July. The colours are the daily averaged surface air temperatures (the line between green and yellow is 283K or 15C).




Temperature is going up and down with each passing weather system and some weeks, such as in late May, and significantly warmer than the one before or after. The coldest time of this winter was a polar outbreak in early July. The trend arrows show we have stopped cooling and I think we are now turning the corner and the trend may now be to warming temperatures (but there may still be some cold outbreaks).

When we look at the temperature anomolies an interesting pattern is revealed with places in the north having a cooler than normal winter and places in the

south having a warmer than normal winter, but for that brief cold snap in early July.



The isobar map for the same period shows lots of lows and not many highs.



ANECDOTES OF A YOTTIE

Sailing on to Curaçao we entered the sheltered Spanish waters anchoring off Sarifundy's. This place seemed like paradise where everything was on trust, which worked well on the whole, till someone added stuff to your list.

Next stop Oranjestad, Aruba, here there were sniffer dogs searching the yachts. A couple of days later when we

Puerto La Cruz was amazingly clean considering it was Carnival time. Probably the local militia patrolling with machine guns and machetes was having an effect. Everything was so cheap we ended up spending a fortune! We decided not to visit inland due to the political unrest.

One highlight while island hopping was sitting in the cockpit of an American yacht in a bay on Las Aves watching *Pretty Woman*. The wind was starting to get up and that night it blew 30 knots and the snatch line broke, causing us to think we had hit something. The next morning we set off for the ABC Islands, anchoring overnight at Kralendijk, Bonaire. I was hoping to see Flamingoes but didn't see one.

left a surveillance plane flew so low and close it gave us quite a fright.

On our way to the Panama Canal, a booby bird hitched a ride one night and we saw two manatees and some dolphins. We arrived at Cristóbal Harbour in the middle of the night and threaded our way into the yacht anchorage. We spent a week sorting out paperwork for the transit. It cost us US\$120 which paid for the pilot for two days and someone to measure the boat, plus a Panama Canal Guide for yachts. We were astonished to later receive US\$44 back. We had to have four line handlers plus the skipper and pilot so we arranged with our friends on *Kayos* II to help take our boat through and we would help them. We organised a local girl to come with us.

We had been warned of unrest and high crime rates and told to get a taxi to the bank and pay him to wait. There were armed guards inside and outside all very unnerving. Even worse was in the supermarket and the power going off and being in the pitch black with armed guards. It was a relief to get back to the security of the dock.

The whole procedure of the transit was very efficient. We spent a night anchored Gatún Lake and left *Noridiam* on a mooring at Balboa Yacht



Club. We caught a bus back and repeated the trip on *Kayos II* the next day. Hello Pacific Ocean, here we come.

Mission Accomplished ... continued


New York was a wonderful experience. However, we were very much 'against the clock' on our quest to reach Annapolis, so on August 15th we moved on again. On entering Manasquan Harbour, we were boarded by very determined US Coast Guards. However, once they saw our permit, they could not have been more helpful, leading us to their pier and making sure we were safely tied up for the night then suggesting a good inexpensive restaurant nearby.

We had hoped to avoid Cape May by using the canal but found the first bridge at 55ft to be 1ft too low, we had thought that waiting for low tide would provide a solution to this but a careful approach saw us having to turn away at the last moment. Non-the-less we had a good sail around Cape May to the Delaware River where the Ospreys nesting on top of the channel marker posts were teaching their young to fish. We anchored off the village of Queenstown and met up with friends we had made in the Virgin Islands.

We were fortunate enough to borrow their car too for our visit to Annapolis to meet with Anne Wallis-White, the so-called Oueen of Caribbean Charters. During our meeting we invited her to dinner aboard Marathias and that she would bring her friend and associate Paula Bender with her. I took special care to ensure the dinner was a good one beginning with canapés and cocktails in the cockpit followed by dinner in the saloon. She asked us lots of questions about what we had been doing before cruising and was especially interested to learn that David was the David Sadler who designed Sadler Yachts, and of my developing Whatley Manor to turn a semi-derelict stately home into a retreat for the rich and famous. All the while Paula took copious notes. After dinner Anne ask to have a look around and proceeded to inspect everything, even under the mattresses, the wardrobes, and shower compartments. Returning to the table she sat down and said: "Yes, you'll do."

Anne advised us to charter out of Antigua, and demand to be in Nicholson's December Charter Boat Show and to tell them she would be sending clients.


We had a hard slog back to the Caribbean but got our spot at the Show, albeit in the back corner. We were the smallest boat there by a considerable margin, in fact, we were the only boat that took just two people. As it happened this was to our advantage as there were many couples who just didn't want to share.



We had hoped to charter for about six weeks, but in that first season we did twelve. The second year we did twenty-four weeks. Most of our guests were delightful but there are always those who are a pain in the butt! It was hard work and we had to use the smaller forward cabin, so to remind ourselves it was worth it we had a sign over our bed T.O.T.M. – Think of the Money!
